SACRAMENTS

To receive Sacraments at San Miguel Church, you must be registered and active at the Parish. If you are unsure if you are registered, please contact the Parish Office to verify.

Baptism: Pre-baptism instruction is required for parents and godparents. Sponsors/godparents must be practicing Catholics in good standing with the Church, at least 16 years of age, have received all their Sacraments of Initiation and if married, must be married in the Catholic Church. If the godparent is single, they must not be cohabiting. Parents and godparents must attend baptismal classes before the baptism of the child. The next class is October 2, 2025 at 6:30PM. Parents must register their child at least two weeks before attending class. Contact the office for additional information.

First Reconciliation and First Holy Communion: This is a two-year program that begins in the 2nd grade. Contact the Religious Education director for additional information.

Confirmation: This is a two-year program that begins in the 8th grade. Those teens who are registering for Confirmation classes must be Baptized and have received their 1st Holy Communion. Contact the Religious Education director at the Parish Office for additional information.

Marriage: Couples who plan to marry at San Miguel Church must contact the Parish Office at least 6 months prior to the wedding date. A mandatory pre-marriage program is required.

Anointing of the Sick: Please contact the Parish Office.

Funeral Mass: The cost for funeral services is \$150. Please contact the office for additional information and to coordinate services as soon as possible.

The Bosom of Abraham

In today's Gospel (Luke 16:19-31), Jesus relates the parable of the rich man and Lazarus: "The poor man died and was carried by the angels to Abraham's bosom. The rich man also died and was buried." This phrase, "bosom of Abraham," has intrigued theologians, biblical scholars, and the faithful throughout history. It is a vivid image that invites exploration.

To understand Abraham's bosom, one must first understand Sheol. In the Old Testament, Sheol is the shadowy realm of the dead where all souls descended, whether righteous or wicked. Because of original sin, the gates of heaven were closed to humanity after the Fall of Adam and Eve (cf. Romans 5:12). Union with God was broken, and until redemption was accomplished through Jesus Christ, no soul could enter heaven. As a result, Sheol became the common destiny of the dead.

Sheol is depicted as a place of silence, darkness, and separation from the fullness of God's presence. Psalm 6:5 laments: "For in death there is no remembrance of you; in Sheol who can give you praise?" Likewise, Job 7:9–10 declares: "As the cloud fades and vanishes, so he who goes down to Sheol does not come up; he returns no more to his house." These passages show Sheol as a place lacking the joy of worship and communion, yet not identical with the final hell of the damned.

At the same time, hints of hope appear. Psalm 16:10 proclaims: "For you will not abandon my soul to Sheol or let your holy one see corruption." This anticipates Christ's Resurrection and his victory over death. Similarly, Isaiah 26:19 speaks of the dead rising: "Your dead shall live, their bodies shall rise. You who dwell in the dust, awake and sing for joy!" These glimpses foreshadow the transformation that would come through the Messiah.

Within Sheol, Jewish tradition came to distinguish between the lot of the wicked and the blessed repose of the righteous. By the time of Jesus, some rabbis taught that the just awaited resurrection in the company of the patriarchs, particularly Abraham, the father of the faithful. Thus, "Abraham's bosom" became a way of describing the secure and honored place of the righteous in Sheol, awaiting redemption.

The image of reclining on Abraham's bosom conveys intimacy and favor. Just as the beloved disciple reclined on Jesus' bosom at the Last Supper (John 13:23), so the righteous rest close to Abraham, their covenant father. For Jesus' hearers, this was a vivid picture of consolation and covenantal belonging.

In today's Gospel, Jesus contrasts Lazarus' comfort with the rich man's torment, showing the justice of God after death. This parable dramatizes both divine reversal in which the poor beggar is exalted and the rich oppressor condemned and the separation of destinies after death.

Elsewhere, Jesus deepens the hope of the righteous. To the repentant thief, he promises: "Today you will be with me in Paradise" (Luke 23:43). St. Paul echoes this hope in 2 Corinthians 12:2–4, describing the "third

heaven" and Paradise. These passages show that Abraham's bosom was not the final goal but a provisional state, soon to be transformed by Christ's victory over death at the resurrection.

In today's Gospel Jesus introduces the "great chasm" fixed between the righteous and the wicked, "between us and you a great chasm is established to prevent anyone from crossing who might wish to gofrom our side to yours or from your side to ours." This chasm represents the finality of divine judgment and the unbridgeable divide between communion with God and separation from Him. St. John Chrysostom highlighted its moral lesson that repentance is possible only in this life; after death, the opportunity is lost. The chasm also symbolizes the radical difference between a soul in God's friendship and one that has rejected Him.

The Apostles' Creed proclaims that at Christ's death, "He descended into hell." This does not mean Christ entered the hell of the damned, but rather Sheol, the abode of the dead. The Gospels allude to this when Jesus says the Son of Man will be "three days and three nights in the heart of the earth" (Matthew 12:40). St. Peter writes that Christ "went and preached to the spirits in prison" (1 Peter 3:19).

The Fathers understood this as Christ descending to Abraham's bosom, proclaiming victory, and liberating the righteous who had awaited Him. In this way, He bridged the separation caused by the Fall. Those who once rested in hope were now ushered into the beatific vision. The bosom of Abraham, once a place of waiting, was transformed into the fullness of Paradise.

The bosom of Abraham is thus a rich biblical and theological image signifying the blessed repose of the righteous in Sheol, awaiting redemption. It highlights both the reality of divine justice and the intimacy of covenantal communion. The great chasm warns of the irrevocability of judgment, while Christ's descent into hell reveals God's decisive act of redemption, shattering the gates of death, opening heaven, and transforming the resting place of the patriarchs into eternal glory. By the bosom of Abraham, we are reminded that death is not the end, but those who abide in Christ will be gathered to the Father in everlasting life.








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
