

SACRAMENTS

To receive Sacraments at San Miguel Church, you must be registered and active at the Parish. If you are unsure if you are registered, please contact the Parish Office to verify.

Baptism: Pre-baptism instruction is required for parents and godparents. Sponsors/godparents must be practicing Catholics in good standing with the Church, at least 16 years of age, have received all their Sacraments of Initiation and if married, must be married in the Catholic Church. If the godparent is single, they must not be cohabiting. Parents and godparents must attend baptismal classes before the baptism of the child. **The next class is November 6, 2025 at 6:30PM.** Parents must register their child at least two weeks before attending class. Contact the office for additional information.

First Reconciliation and First Holy Communion: This is a two-year program that begins in the 2nd grade. Contact the Religious Education director for additional information.

Confirmation: This is a two-year program that begins in the 8th grade. Those teens who are registering for Confirmation classes must be Baptized and have received their 1st Holy Communion. Contact the Religious Education director at the Parish Office for additional information.

Marriage: Couples who plan to marry at San Miguel Church must contact the Parish Office at least 6 months prior to the wedding date. A mandatory pre-marriage program is required.

Anointing of the Sick: Please contact the Parish Office.

Funeral Mass: The cost for funeral services is \$150. Please contact the office for additional information and to coordinate services as soon as possible.

Living Inside the Word

"Continue in what you have learned," Paul tells Timothy, "because you know from whom you learned it, and that from childhood you have known the sacred writings." Today's reading, 2 Timothy 3:14 - 4:2, is a nudge from a spiritual father who knows that Scripture is not just a book on the shelf, it is the place where God keeps meeting us, and Paul piles up the reasons why. The sacred writings are inspired by God, they teach, they correct, they train us in righteousness, and they equip us for every good work. Then he hands Timothy a charge that spills over to us: preach the word, be persistent in season and out of season, convince, rebuke, and encourage with all patience and teaching. In other words, let the word shape you, then let it flow through you to others.

Reading and studying Scripture is how we learn the story of our own salvation. Page by page God discloses His plan, creation to covenant to Christ to Church to the hope of glory. If we don't understand this story, we risk reducing faith to slogans rather than substance. When we understand this story, the Cross and Resurrection land with both force and compassion. We see why the Word became flesh, why He died for sinners, why baptism and Eucharist are the way we obtain and sustain life in the new creation. Paul says Scripture is profitable for teaching, and its first lesson is simple: God never stops seeking us.

Scripture also changes how we pray. Paul's list includes correction and training, but what rises from those lines is relationship. When we sit with the Gospels, we do not just learn that God loves us, we begin to feel it. Christ's voice becomes familiar. His questions search our hearts. His mercy steadies our hearts when guilt weighs heavy. The Psalms give words to our fear and our joy. The prophets give courage when the world feels crooked. Over time the Bible becomes a place where God's tone becomes recognizable, and that familiarity breeds trust.

Scripture opens the mysteries of faith the way St. Teresa of Avila's Interior Castle opens the soul: room by room, light deepening as we move inward. In the Catholic sense, mystery is not a locked door but a hallway of doors, each one opening into a more radiant chamber. The Trinity, the Incarnation, grace, and glory are not puzzles to solve but dwelling places to inhabit, and Scripture is the map that shows us the way through them. As we read, the Spirit invites us farther inside, enlarging the cramped images we carry of God and expanding them until we begin to see, as Teresa did, that every room is filled with the same light, the presence of Christ shining at the center.

Study also prepares us to share the faith. Paul's charge to "proclaim the word" assumes understanding, patience, and readiness. Scripture not only forms our hearts, it also equips our minds so that, as Peter says, we may "always be ready to give a defense to anyone who asks for the reason for our hope" (1 Peter 3:15). When a friend wonders why Catholics honor Mary, asks about confession, or struggles to grasp the Eucharist, a Scripture-shaped mind can answer clearly, kindly, and from the heart of the Gospel. You do not need to be a scholar; you just need to know the story, know the Savior who lives within it, and know how the apostles handed

that truth on so that, with humility and confidence, you can bear witness to it in your own life.

One of Scripture's great mysteries is the unity of the Old and New Testaments. The fathers used to say that the New Testament is hidden in the Old, and the Old is unveiled in the New. The Old Testament carries promises, figures, and patterns that bloom in Christ. The lamb of Passover points to the Lamb of God. The manna hints at the Bread of Life. David's kingship foreshadows the true King. When you see these threads, the Bible stops feeling like two books and becomes one symphony of grace. In the Mass the Church makes this visible. The Old Testament reading and the Gospel are chosen together, the first planting the seed, the second revealing the fruit, and the psalm teaches us how to respond. The New Testament letters often show how that grace works in the life of the Church. Week by week we are trained to read and understand Scripture as a whole.

If you are wondering how to begin to study scripture or how to go deeper, start simple and make steady progress (and skip Leviticus until later). Listen to Father Mike Schmitz's *The Bible in a Year* podcast, then tackle his *Catechism in a Year* podcast to see how Scripture breathes through doctrine. Keep a good study aid within reach, such as the *Ignatius Catholic Study Bible*, whose notes tie texts to the larger canon, and the *Catholic Commentary on Sacred Scripture* series, which is pastoral and clear (it can be purchased as a series or a book at a time). Read slowly, pray with what you read, and bring your questions both to the Lord and to trusted guides like Fr. John or the deacons. Take it deliberately. This is a life's work.

Paul's words to Timothy are both tender and firm. "All Scripture is inspired by God," he reminds him, breathed by the Spirit who still breathes life into those who read it. Scripture builds us up from within; it shapes our minds, strengthens our faith, and trains our hearts for love and endurance. When it takes root in us, it naturally bears fruit. Formed by the word, we become its living witnesses, ready to proclaim it with patience and courage and to pass on to others what we ourselves have found: the saving plan of the Father, the mercy of the Son, and the steady light of the Spirit.


